## Christians should go to prison!

When Jesus in Matthew 25 speaks of feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, and visiting the prisoner – this verse became a personal call to action for our 2015 intake of new volunteers. Carla Cressey visits women in the Adelaide Pre Release Centre (APC) each week and began volunteering with Second Chances SA a year ago. Hearing about prison ministry struck a deep chord in her heart: 'Jesus came for people that are broken and need Him.' Tony Rogers visits men at the Yatala Labour Prison (YLP) also began volunteering in-prison last year and found God doing a similar work in him. He knew God was softening his heart towards prisoners and those on the fringes of society when he realised these were simply people who were 'not bad, but just broken.' Phil Hanel has been visiting prisoners at the Adelaide Remand Centre (ARC) since November last year. He feels strangely comfortable there. He's so enthusiastic he'd like to be full time to meet and help the guys through practical helps every day of the week.

Carla, Tony and Phil are part of a group of six new in-prison volunteers 2015, also made up of Bryan Sellars (YLP), Peter Hawke Port Lincoln prison (PTL) and Greer Gabrielli Adelaide Womens Prison (AWP). ## They're Falling Through the Cracks

Recently I met the brother-in-law of a female offender and single mum with two children. She'd been pulled over by police to find her vehicle was unregistered and there was a warrant out for her arrest. She had violated the law on several occasions for drug dealing and the Court gave her bail both times. This time she was arrested, taken into custody and imprisoned. What angered the relative was on the day of her arrest, no one visited the home where the two school aged children, a boy and young girl, were living, to check on their welfare. Neither the police nor anyone from Families SA came to check on a girl as young as eight. Other adults boarding in the home watched over them but fortunately, the prisoner's sister visited on a daily basis to check up on them until the mother was released.

This story is typical of what is tragically happening on a weekly basis. The children of prisoners are falling through the cracks. No government knows who they are or where they live. No government keeps a record of how many there are yet they are the most vulnerable. They have no voice and they have no one advocating for them — except us. If a grandparent or suitable carer does not step up to the plate immediately when

a parent has been taken into custody, what happens to the child or in many cases the children? How long will it be until someone responsible is notified of their status? On admission to prison are they routinely asked, 'If you have children who is caring for them?' The answer is, 'NO!' This question is not asked. What sort of society are we living in when the innocent victims of crime are not considered or cared for as a matter of priority? We know PKs are seven times more likely to go to prison than their peers. No other organisation in SA has identified the need nor is meeting the crisis exclusively for PKs. Will you help us help them? Help us advocate and educate the community to steer at-risk PKs away from crime. Support our PK Family Care Team now and beyond 2016.



## **Our Unique Team**

Thanks to a Special Youth Grant (SYG) awarded in December 2013 by the Department of Community and Social Inclusion, the **PK Family Care Team** was formed. It is a three year pilot program to steer vulnerable children of prisoners away from contact with the Justice System. The measure of our success is that 99% of our PKs have avoided contact with the Justice System.

A typical case study goes like this, "A teenage boy I worked with was in trouble with the law and disengaged from school. He struggled to transition from living in an unstable home with his mum while his dad was in jail, to living with his aunty and cousins for safety reasons. I was able to get alongside him, work out supports at school, organise for him to go on 'Teen Boys Camp', and equip him to reengage in high school."

#### Since its formation in January 2014 the PK Family Care Team has:

- Formed a four person professional team with complementary skills.
- Developed **122 partners**; other agencies and schools to benefit PKs through referrals.
- Recorded over **814 PKs** on our secure database.
- Made over **600 home visits** across 11 Council areas in Metropolitan Adelaide.
- Established strong relationships with over 350 PKs.
- Created over 220 goal plans with PKs.
- Formed direct client relationships with over 182 families.
- Supported 24 grandparents who became caregivers through a parent's imprisonment.
- Provided vocational training to 25 PKs during 2015.
- Purchased brand new school/sports uniforms and shoes to **12 PKs** in the City of Salisbury.

- Delivered over **80 Christmas hampers**.
- Connected **10 PKs** to Church youth groups across Metropolitan Adelaide.
- Took **hundreds of PK Birthday presents** to the birthday boy or girl in their birthday week.
- Supplied 40 'Back to School' starter packs to young PK students.
- Supported PKs attending all eight PK Mentoring Camps each year.
- Encouraged PK emerging leaders who attend the annual three day training weekend.
- Promoted services for PKs in the Adelaide Womens Prison.
- Engaged 42 young people and 7 caregivers in a pilot Art Therapy program over two months.
- Launched the Davoren Park Drop-In Centre where **20 PKs attend**.
- Completed an independent evaluation of all services up to March 2016.

A hearty big welcome to our new Team Leader **Melinda Eckert** who commenced in February and is leading the PK Family Care Team into the next phase of its development.

Melinda Eckert

Mel has completed a Bachelor degree in Social Work and brings years of experience and knowledge regarding the plight of what most PK children face on a daily basis. She personally understands what it's like living in a single parent home and even what it is like to become a client of Families SA.

Melinda plans to strengthen the work processes and ensure children benefit fully from a team working cohesively with PK Mentoring Camps and each other. Changes in collecting data will be introduced. Mel is the only full time employee with two working three days and one two days a week.



## **Independent Evaluation**

At the two year mark we knew it was time to seek an evaluation which could give us indicators and recommendations to take the team to the next level especially after having proven the pilot a success.

The 22 page report by **Align Advisors** notes 13 areas for improvement with three related directly to data collection. Other areas include improving internal processes and increasing liaison with external agencies.

The report states, 'The model employs some of the best practice approaches identified in the field of crime prevention. It targets young people at high risk that uses individual goal orientated case management......it addresses the risk and protective factors for offending and creating links into community support......it also focuses these interventions at a key 'transition point', middle school aged children from geographic areas of high risk.'

As one team member said, 'The team is achieving good things that are very necessary and I think it needs to keep developing and becoming more and more professional in how we do it.'
