BETTER TO BUILD A CHILD - than repair an adult

Although societies recognize that the future lies in our children, far too many children have their rights denied every single day. The reality is we do not choose our parents. We do not choose to come into a home where work ethic is not modelled, education not valued, positive values such as honesty, respect and encouragement are not practiced.

What we take for granted as a good start in a good family, is not the experience of every child.

Many South Australian children are on the back foot lacking good nurturing and guidance.

Frederick Douglass, a slavery abolitionist in 1855 said, "It is easier to build strong children than to repair broken men." The statement is simple and profound

and applies from generation to generation. And yet we as a society and as individual families, neglect the building, facilitate the breaking and balk at the cost and commitment of the repair.

The goal of building a child is to equip and empower them while they're young so when they become adults they're in better emotional, mental, spiritual, financial, and or physical positions than before.

If you want to change the world through education, there is only so much energy and resources. Frederick Douglass is clearly saying that you should focus on the children.

Here at Second Chances we place a great value on the children of prisoners. Our aim is to give them encouragement to complete their education, plus positive life skills. Many struggle with basic numeracy, literacy and they suffer from being malnourished. The other day we delivered a fruit basket to a child with hand, foot and mouth disease. The standard of hygiene in many homes is well below any standard we would tolerate.

Please, let's keep the children – citizens of tomorrow – uppermost in our minds, actions and investment of time and resources.
